

**P4S project alternative strategies for clubs to choose what works best in their community and club.**

One strategy: Offer scholarships to students. Can vary from one to 10.

Second strategy: Partner with other Rotary clubs in your community and/or school district to offer scholarships. With multiple clubs, you may be able to add classrooms.

Third strategy: Decide not to offer scholarships. If the school district has capacity, help get the word out about the importance of preschool to attract families to apply to place their child in a class.

Fourth strategy: District lacks space for more preschool students. Rotary club can partner with local facilities to provide classroom space. Help get desks, and other classroom furnishings and materials. Examples: Community service organizations including Boys and Girls Clubs, churches, or businesses.

Fifth strategy: School district needs transportation to get children to preschool. Club helps find and pay for buses and drivers.

Sixth strategy: Help school district add classroom space, transportation, give scholarship to fill the classroom with 15-20 preschool students.
